Properties and Easements

We are acquiring easements in Tower Park in 2020. These easements follow the major creeks that begin behind the amphitheater and near the basketball courts and also includes the large creek that straddles Tower Park and Carmel Manor. The transition should be complete in the first quarter of 2020.

We surveyed the Hill property and the Hubbard easement and installed conservation markers around the perimeters.

The Hubbard easement continues to develop into a focal point for many of our outreach programs. We are excited with its transformation into an environmental experience center. We now have two bee hives that will produce Hubbard Honey. The bees found in the studio in 2017 have been married to another hive and they are busy producing honey and pollinating plants throughout town. Volunteer Rick Stegeman is the beekeeper and has prepared some interesting and fun presentations for visitors of all ages. A composting project is also on the property run by volunteer Mary Ellen Millar. We became one of the founding members of the fledgling Harlan Hubbard Legacy group that includes an alliance of museums, colleges, collectors, and friends working to preserve Hubbard's work and philosophy.

We have committed part of our River Road property to compost the city's leaves. Our goal is to turn those leaves into compost for use in the parks, our properties, and to sell back to residents. It takes time to make quality compost so don't expect it anytime soon.

We continue to work with Highlands High School to develop a natural laboratory and classroom in the Crawford preserve behind the field house. We are excited for students to learn more about the natural world and look forward to hearing about their studies.

Events

FTFC celebrated its ten year anniversary by hosting a number of events in honor of that. Here are a few of them:

Fort Thomas Passport Program - We developed the urban trails for this city program.

Earth Day was May 5 and continues to be the largest Earth Day celebration in NKY.

Independence Day Parade. We won the float award for the second year in a row. Plan to be a part of it in 2020.

Maple Syrup making in March. Tricia walked us through the process and even tapped some trees in the park.

Forest Bathing Event on August 25 inTower Park led by Tricia Schroeder was a chance to stop, breathe in, and focus on the natural world.

Social Meet Ups organized by Sidney Thomas were a fun way to socialize at a local establishment and business supporter, Grassroots and Vine.

April Wildflower Walk with John Homer is always a hit as a large group examined the varieties of native flowers in Tower Park.

Harlan Hubbard Studio and Nature Preserve



We continue to restore the building where the Conservancy was founded. The pollinator garden had a successful second year. Plants are multiplying and attracting more pollinators. The honeybees that we found in the building are safe in two hives in the woods. It will become an educational focal point as well as a honey producer.



Studio Hours: We will open the studio on the third Saturday of the month from 10:00 - 1:00 for those who want to get in touch with nature, or to meditate, paint, create music, or pursue other creative endeavors. The community is invited to use the space in a creative and environmentally sound way.

Education:
